I grew up in a village near Phnom Penh in a loving family with one younger brother. My mother became pregnant and gave birth when I was 16, but the baby died two hours later. My mother fell sick and died soon after. That was what changed my life. We spent all our money on her funeral, and I had to drop out of school and begin working to help support my family. A woman who knew my father offered me a job doing kitchen work in a bar, and I accepted.

I started out working in the kitchen, then began delivering ice to customers' drinks, and the customers started to like me. I preferred working in the kitchen, but when the restaurant owner asked me to entertain customers in private rooms I had to obey.

When the customers came in, I had to sit in a line with the other girls and wait for them to choose one of us. Sometimes a customer liked me and wanted to take me away for sex, but I always said 'no'. I was afraid because my friends told me that sometimes customers hurt the girls or sell them to someone else.

While I was working at the bar, two rescue agents came to get my friend. She went to live at Destiny Rescue. We were still in contact, and she told me it was a good place and that I should join her. When I first came to visit Destiny Rescue I liked the program. Girls who work in bars like I did don't have good reputations, and I wanted to have a good reputation. So I decided to live at Destiny Rescue too.

I felt loved and accepted at the house. The environment was good, and the house sisters looked after me and encouraged me and told me about Jesus. I used to go to church when I was a lot younger, but only to eat the cookies. I didn't know Jesus until the house sisters helped me understand more about him. I now know Jesus as my protector and helper.

Now I work in a Western restaurant, and I really enjoy it. I plan to continue working here for a while and save money to open my own small restaurant. I want to cook Western food for people. I still see my father and brother often. Family is very important to me!

I want to encourage girls working in a bar to start looking for a new job. Customers at bars can be dangerous!

When I was working at the bar, my life was hard. I never imagined I could have a life this good. Now I am blessed to have a good job and a plan for the future.
